I attended the VAC Spring Assembly in April where we voted to unpair the Treatment & Accessibilities from each other, giving each their own standing committee. This will allow for greater visibility on each of these. I am really excited to see how our members will focus on ways to reach those who have limited ability to seek recovery.

At the 74th General Service Conference, there were several exciting things approved. The Conference voted 91-38 (70.5%) in favor of the Conference Literature Committee's recommendation that the draft manuscript *Plain Language Big Book: A Tool for Reading Alcoholics Anonymous* be approved with minor editorial changes. There were also 2 new pamphlets approved, and the General Service Board has agreed to increased financial transparency.

Locally, we are looking to add more District sponsored events that we can fellowship at. We are looking for a summer event, and any ideas would be welcomed. Please reach out to your GSR or to me directly with suggestions. Ideas that have been presented so far are a movie night, spades tournament, or a chili cookoff.

A Message From Your Woodbridge Community

Happy Sober Day, fellow members. Today I'm grateful for AA. When I came into the program December 28, 2018, I was a broken Man. I have been to AA before but, I was never into the program. I had the but's, I didn't want God forced on me, I wanted to pick and choose what steps to work, and so on. I thought I could do it on my own. Well, if I could do it on my own how did I end up in 4 rehabs, IOP's, and multiple ASAP programs. When I started using the HOW, Honest, Openminded and Willingness, of this program it truly started to change me.

I had to start being honest with myself. Had to realize I was powerless over alcohol and my life had become unmanageable. When I was able to do that, I was honest with myself. I realized that if I had 1 drink, I couldn't just stop at one. Many days I would say I'm not drinking today, and I would up at either 7-11 or the liquor store at opening. Living in a storage facility, when I could be at home with my wife and kids, was not living a manageable life. When I became honest with myself that I needed help I was able to be open-minded.

When I became openminded I was able to believe that a power greater than myself could restore me to sanity. For me that was a problem because I had a problem with God. I thought God was responsible for all the bad things that happened, and I was responsible for the good things (insanity). So, I was suggested to use the group as my higher power, the group. The group was happy and sober, so why not be open-minded to their suggestions, they had what I wanted. Being open-minded to trying new things was a new thing for me, I was the one who knew how to handle chaos. Then I realized my thinking was what got me into that chair in the meeting. Then the process was to become willing to try their suggestions.

Becoming willing to try something new was different for me. I had to be willing to turn my will and my life over to the care of my higher power. If someone in the group said jump, I would jump. If that would keep me sober, I would be willing to do anything. It was suggested to get a sponsor and work the steps; I had never done that before. So, scared to death, I asked Mike E., to be my sponsor (of course thinking he would say no). He said yes, and his first question to me was "Are you done?", of course my answer was yes. My brother suggested that I shake 5 people's hand at each meeting, get their number, and call them.

I started doing that, it got me out of myself. It also helped me to build my network of people in recovery. Today I'm willing to try anything different than my old self. When I'm willing to face my FEAR's, Face Everything And Recover, things work out well. It's when I am unwilling to face FEAR it becomes F____ Everything And Run, that is the alcoholic in me.

Today I'm honest, open-minded and willing to do whatever it takes to live this great life of sobriety. I remind myself of the first 3 steps every morning, talk to my higher power throughout the day, and work on some step or myself every day. AA has given me a life I never would have imagined 5 years ago. Today I am happy, joyous and free. Have friends that I care about and who care about me. Most of all AA gave me Andrew, someone I can live with today.
